DRIVING SAFELY IN THE WET



The streets are busier as more people drive to avoid the rain and the roads become slippery. There's the water itself, but the rain also brings oil and other slippery muck to the surface. It's harder to see the road ahead, your windscreen becomes foggy and your brakes are less effective. It's no surprise that in the wet weather there are more prangs, but there are some simple things you can do to avoid getting into trouble.

* Slow down

It seems obvious, but it's always a good idea in wet weather to ease up on the gas.

You should also increase the distance between you and the cars ahead. In normal conditions, it's recommended that you leave a three second gap – in the wet, try to double this.

★ Take it easy

You need to take extra care in all aspects of your driving. Accelerate and steer smoothly. Avoid slamming on the brakes – apply steady pressure.

* Look out

Make sure you can see and be seen. Turn on your lights and use your air conditioner and/or demister to keep your windows from fogging up. In heavy rain, you'll wish you had replaced those worn old windscreen wipers. Before that happens, check out whether you need new ones – they're cheap to buy and easy to install.

* Watch out

Keep an eye out for water on the road. Sometimes water can gather in dips or unseen potholes, creating deceptively deep pools. Cars have been known to 'aquaplane' after hitting water like this (that is, 'glide' out of control across the road). If you do come across water across the road, then cut your speed right back to 30 or 40km/h. After you've driven through, touch your brakes lightly to dry out the brake pads.

Obviously, if there's water flowing across a road in a low-lying country area, for example, you should stop and check the depth before continuing (it shouldn't be higher than the lowest point on the wheel rim).

* Patience

The most important thing is to be patient. When it's raining and chaotic, everyone's in the same boat...

Medical professionals warn a nightmarish flu season may be imminent this winter...

All numbers released for this time of year are the highest ever.

The average number of infections for this time of year are usually a couple of hundred. The concern lays with already well over 4000 cases officially reported and it's only mid-April.

It's not helping the possible shocker flu season with the flu vaccine being delayed by a whole month however, the delay was needed to include two new nasty flu strains wreaking havoc in Europe.

The cost to Australia each year from the flu is close to bumping \$900m annually. This includes days off work, cost of vaccinations, hospitalisations, trips to the Doc etc.

As we approach the countdown to get the vaccine there are some tips to avoid catching and spreading the flu:

- Become mildly OCD with washing your hands include anti-bacterial hand gel where possible.

Congratulations to Chris Daly from the Riverina who received employee of the quarter.


Chris's work ethic has been outstanding over the last few months and he has been commended by our clients for the effort and commitment he has shown on a daily basis.


